REPORT OF THE MANAGER

Fund Performance

Da Cheng Hong Kong Dollar Money Market Fund (the “Sub-Fund”) seeks to achieve a return in Hong Kong Dollars in line with prevailing money market rates in Hong Kong, with primary considerations of both capital security and liquidity. As of 31 December 2023, the Sub-Fund aggregates a total net asset size of approximately HKD150,725,434.

A summary of the performance of the Sub-Fund is set out below (as at 31 December 2023).

Market Overview

With the announcement of the outcome of the FOMC regularly scheduled meeting in December 2023, the federal funds rate remained unchanged at 5.25% to 5.50%. The market started to expect the dollar risk-free rate reached peak in 2023 and expected a rate cut starts in 2024. Looking back to 2023, the Fed had raised FED fund rates four times to lower the inflation. The inflation level in US fell big as it was driven by the relatively high level of interest rates in the US. By the end of 2023, the CPI in the United States dropped to 3.4% YOY and 0.3% MOM, which had made substantial progress in fighting high inflation. The HKD money market continued to benefit from the high interest rate level of the USD in 2023, and provided relatively attractive returns throughout the year, a more than 4% annualized return level. In the end of 2023, HKD deposit rate even exceeded that of the US dollar deposit rate. In 2023, HKD 1M HIBOR rose from 4.21 to 5.27, 106 bps, close to the rate hikes of the USD interest rate. The higher HIBOR rate also helped the Hong Kong dollar stay in a steady range in 2023, ending at 7.8115 per USD.

Outlook

With the U.S. Federal Reserve hold rates steady, it is likely the interest rate might reach peak in 2024, market is now started to focus on when to start the cut rates in 2024, and how many times it will be. But we think “high for longer” is still the market’s more objective forecast, mainly because the FOMC’s minutes stated that “it was critical that the stance of monetary policy be kept sufficiently restrictive to return inflation to the Committee’s 2 percent objective over time”, since US economic data remains resilient, Inflation slow to 3.4% YOY , but there is still “a ways away” the FED’s 2% target. The High level interest rates will have a longer impact on earnings for US domestic companies. Companies may need to reassess existing funding strategies. While for China, a relatively loose domestic macro environment, Chinese issuers will have more financing advantages than domestic enterprises in the US. To some extent, we are still optimistic that Chinese issuers’ USD credit will have better risk-reward in 2024. A 3-4 times rate cuts may be in 2024 which brings the short-term interest rates market back to the end of 2022 level, which is still relatively high in 15 years. HKD may also keep the rates movement pace as USD, So in 2024, HKD money market might still be able to provide a 4% above return by year end and the Hong Kong dollar might stay in a steady range.

Opinion

What we have audited

1 General information

DCI Investment Trust (the “Trust”) is an open-ended unit trust established as an umbrella fund under the laws of Hong Kong by a trust deed dated 30 December 2011, as amended (the “Trust Deed”), between Da Cheng International Asset Management Company Limited as Manager (the “Manager”) and BOCI-Prudential Trustee Limited as Trustee (the “Trustee”). As at 31 December 2023, the Trust has six sub-funds, Da Cheng Hong Kong Dollar Money Market Fund (the “Sub-Fund”), Da Cheng China Balanced Fund, Da Cheng Short term Bond Fund, Da Cheng Overseas China Concept Fund, Da Cheng Money Market Fund and Da Cheng China Sustainable Equity Fund (collectively, the “Sub-Funds”). The date of commencement of operations of the Sub-Fund was 29 November 2019.

The Trust and the Sub-Fund are authorised by the Securities and Futures Commission of Hong Kong (the “SFC”) under Section 104(1) of the Hong Kong Securities and Futures Ordinance and is required to comply with the Code on Unit Trusts and Mutual Funds established by the SFC (the “SFC Code”).

The Sub-Fund seeks to achieve a return in Hong Kong dollar (“HKD”) in line with prevailing money market rates in Hong Kong, with primary considerations of both capital security and liquidity.

The Sub-Fund’s investment objective is to invest in short-term deposits and high quality money market instruments including debt securities. The Sub-Fund seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing primarily (i.e. not less than 70% of its net asset value) in HKD-denominated and settled short-term deposits and high quality money market instruments (including debt securities) issued by governments, quasi-governments, international organisations and financial institutions. The Sub-Fund may invest in commercial papers, certificates of deposits and commercial bills.

These financial statements were only prepared for the Sub-Fund for the year ended 31 December 2023.

2 Summary of material accounting policies

The material accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Sub-Fund have been prepared in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards. IFRS Accounting Standards comprise the following authoritative literature:

- IFRS Accounting Standards
- IAS Standards
- Interpretations developed by the IFRS Interpretations Committee (IFRIC Interpretations) or its predecessor body, the Standing Interpretations Committee (SIC Interpretations).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of investments and derivative financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss.

2.1 Basis of preparation (Continued)

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS Accounting Standards requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires the Trustee and the Manager (the “Management”) to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Sub-Fund’s accounting policies.

Standards and amendments to existing standards effective 1 January 2023

The Sub-Fund has applied the following new and amended standards for its annual reporting period commencing 1 January 2023:

- Disclosure of Accounting Policies – Amendments to IAS 1 and IFRS Practice Statement 2
- Definition of Accounting Estimates – Amendments to IAS 8
- Deferred Tax related to Assets and Liabilities arising from a Single Transaction – Amendments to IAS 12

The amendments listed above did not have any impact on the amounts recognized in prior periods and are not expected to significantly affect the current or future periods.

New standards, amendments and interpretations effective after 1 January 2023

A number of new standards, amendments to standards and interpretations are effective for annual periods beginning after 1 January 2023, and have not been early adopted in preparing these financial statements. None of these are expected to have a material effect on the financial statements of the Sub-Fund.

2.2 Foreign currency translation

(i) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Sub-Fund operates (the “functional currency”). The performance of the Sub-Fund is measured and reported to the unitholders in HKD. The Manager considers HKD as the currency that most faithfully represents the economic effects of the underlying transactions, events and conditions. The financial statements are presented in HKD, which is the Sub-Fund’s functional and presentation currency.

(ii) Transactions and balances

Foreign exchange gains and losses arising from translation are included in the statement of comprehensive income.

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign currency assets and liabilities are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rate prevailing at the reporting date.

Foreign exchange gain and loss relating to the financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss is presented in the statement of comprehensive income within “net gain / (loss) on investments”.

The Sub-Fund classifies its investments based on both the Sub-Fund’s business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. The portfolio of financial assets is managed and performance is evaluated on a fair value basis. The Sub-Fund is primarily focused on fair value information and uses that information to assess the assets’ performance and to make decisions. The Sub-Fund has not taken the option to irrevocably designate any equity securities as fair value through other comprehensive income. The contractual cash flows of the Sub-Fund’s debt securities are solely principal and interest, however, these securities are neither held for the purpose of collecting contractual cash flows nor held both for collecting contractual cash flows and for sale. The collection of contractual cash flows is only incidental to achieving the Sub-Fund’s business model’s objective. Consequently, all investments are measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Sub-Fund’s policy requires the Manager to evaluate the information about these financial assets on a fair value basis together with other related financial information.

(ii) Recognition, derecognition and measurement

Regular purchases and sales of investments are recognised on the trade date – the date on which the Sub-Fund commits to purchase or sell the investment. Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognised at fair value. Transaction costs are expensed as incurred in the statement of comprehensive income.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the investments have expired or the Sub-Fund has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Subsequent to initial recognition, all financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value. Gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of the investments are presented in the statement of comprehensive income within “net gains on investments” in the period in which they arise.

Interest on debt securities at fair value through profit or loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income within “interest income from investments” based on the effective interest rate.

2.3 Investments (Continued)

(iii) Fair value estimation

The fair value of financial instruments traded in active markets (such as publicly traded derivatives and trading securities) is based on quoted market prices at the closing of trading on the reporting date. The quoted market price used for financial assets held by the Sub-Fund is the last traded price.

(iv) Transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy

Transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy are deemed to have occurred at the beginning of the reporting period.

2.4 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash at banks and deposits held with banks with original maturities of three months or less.

2.5 Interest income from bank deposits

Interest is recognised on a time-proportionate basis using the effective interest method. Interest income from bank deposits includes interest from cash and cash equivalents.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of an interest bearing asset and of allocating the interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts throughout the expected life of the financial instrument, or a shorter period where appropriate, to the net carrying amount of the financial instrument. When calculating the effective interest rate, the Sub-Fund estimates cash flows considering all contractual terms of the financial instrument (for example, prepayment options) but does not consider future credit losses. The calculation includes all fees and points received between parties to the contract that are an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and all other premiums or discounts.

2.6 Accrued expenses

Accrued expenses are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2.7 Redeemable units

The Sub-Fund issued multiple classes of redeemable units and the redeemable units do not have identical features. The Sub-Fund classified its puttable instruments as financial liabilities. Units are issued and redeemed at the holder's option at prices based on the Sub-Fund's net asset value per unit of the respective class at the time of issue or redemption. The Sub-Fund's net asset value per unit of the respective class is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to unitholders of the respective class with the total number of outstanding units of the respective class.

The redeemable units are carried at amortised cost which corresponds to the redemption amount that is payable at the reporting date if the unitholder exercises the right to put the units back to the Sub-Fund.

2.7 Redeemable units (Continued)

In accordance with the explanatory memorandum of the Sub-Fund, investment positions are valued based on the last traded market price for the purpose of determining the net asset value per unit for subscriptions and redemptions of the Sub-Fund.

2.8 Transaction costs

Transaction costs are costs incurred to acquire financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. They include the transaction handling fees and commissions paid to agents, advisers, brokers and dealers. Transaction costs are expensed as incurred in the statement of comprehensive income.

2.9 Receivables

Receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less allowance for impairment.

2.10 Establishment costs

Establishment costs are recognised as expenses in the period in which they are incurred in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards.

3 Financial risk management

The Sub-Fund is exposed to a variety of risks including but not limited to market price risk, cash flow and fair value interest rate risk, credit and counterparty risk, liquidity risk and currency risk which are associated with the markets in which the Sub-Fund invests.

The following is a summary of the main risks and risk management policies.

3.1 Market price risk

Market price risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual instrument or factors affecting all instruments in the market. All investments present a risk of loss of capital.

The Manager and the Trustee consider the Sub-Fund is not exposed to market price risk as the Sub-Fund did not hold any investment as at 31 December 2023 and 2022.

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3 Financial risk management (Continued)

3.2 Cash flow and fair value interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the future cash flow and the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates.

Interest rate risk arises from the effects of fluctuations in the prevailing levels of market interest rates on the fair value of financial assets and future cash flow.

The tables below summarise the Sub-Fund's exposure to interest rate risks. It includes the Sub-Fund's financial assets at fair values, categorised by the earlier of contractual re-pricing or maturity dates.

The Manager and the Trustee monitor the interest rate risks by quantifying the market exposure in percentage terms and the exposure in duration terms by different countries. As at 31 December 2023, the Sub-Fund had no fixed deposits (2022: HKD53,843,110) and cash and cash equivalents of HKD150,251,955 (2022: HKD59,740,966) and the portfolio weighted average modified duration of the Sub-Fund is 0.05 (2022: 0.07).

Given a 50 basis points (2022: 150 basis points) change in the rate of all fixed deposits and cash and cash equivalents held by the Sub-Fund as at 31 December 2023, the percentage change in net asset value will be the total portfolio weighted average modified duration multiplied by 0.5% (2022: 1.5%), i.e. HKD37,563 (2022: HKD119,263) while holding all other variables constant.

3.3 Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that the value of financial instruments will fluctuate due to changes in foreign exchange rates. The Sub-Fund's overall currency positions are monitored by the Manager and the Trustee. As at 31 December 2023 and 2022, the Sub-Fund had exposure in MOP.

3.4 Credit and counterparty risk

Credit and counterparty risk is the risk that an issuer or counterparty will be unable or unwilling to meet a commitment that it has entered into with the Sub-Fund.

All transactions in securities are settled or paid for upon delivery using approved and reputable brokers. The risk of default is considered minimal, as delivery of securities sold is only made when the broker has received payment. Payment is made on a purchase when the securities have been received by the broker. The trade will fail if either party fails to meet its obligation.

The main concentration to which the Sub-Fund is exposed arises from the Sub-Fund's investments in debt securities. The Sub-Fund does not have explicit restrictions on the minimum credit ratings of securities it may hold. The Manager will actively manage the portfolio of the Sub-Fund. In case of credit rating downgrading, the Manager will adjust the positions in the portfolio using its credit analysis and rating systems that are designed to manage credit risks.

The Sub-Fund had no investments as at 31 December 2023 and 2022.

3.4 Credit and counterparty risk (Continued)

The Manager has assessed the credit quality of the quoted debt securities based on the nature of issuers and historical information about the issuers' default rates.

The Sub-Fund is also exposed to credit and counterparty risk on cash and cash equivalents.

The Sub-Fund measures credit risk and expected credit losses using probability of default, exposure at default and loss given default. Management considers both historical analysis and forward looking information in determining any expected credit loss. At 31 December 2023 and 2022, interest receivable and cash and cash equivalents are held with counterparties with a credit rating of Baa2 or above and are due to be settled within 3 months. Applying the requirements of IFRS 9, the expected credit loss ("ECL") is immaterial for the Sub-Fund and, as such, no ECL has been recognised within the financial statements..

The maximum exposure at the years ended 31 December 2023 and 2022, was the carrying amount of the cash and cash equivalents.

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3 Financial risk management (Continued)

3.5 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Sub-Fund may not be able to generate sufficient cash and resources to settle its obligations in full as they fall due or can only do so on terms that are materially disadvantageous.

The Sub-Fund is exposed to daily redemptions of units in the Sub-Fund. The Sub-Fund invests the majority of its assets in investments that are traded in an active market which can be readily disposed of.

The table below analyses the Sub-Fund's non-derivative financial liabilities into relevant maturity groupings based on the remaining period at the reporting date to the contractual maturity date. The amounts in the table are the contractual undiscounted cash flows. Balances due within 12 months are equal to their carrying balances, as the impact of discounting is not significant.

Units are redeemed on demand at the unitholder's option.

As at 31 December 2023, the total assets of the Sub-Fund amounted to HKD150,819,972 (2022: HKD114,087,980). The Sub-Fund manages its liquidity risk by investing in investments that it expects to be able to liquidate within 7 days or less.

As at 31 December 2023 and 2022, more than 50% of the Sub-Fund was held by a single investor.

3.6 Fair value estimation

The fair value of financial assets traded in active markets (such as publicly traded derivatives and trading securities) are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the period end date. The Sub-Fund utilises the last traded market price as its fair valuation inputs for financial assets.

An active market is a market in which transactions for the asset or liability take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

A financial instrument is regarded as quoted in an active market if quoted prices are readily and regularly available from an exchange, dealer, broker, industry group, pricing service, or regulatory agency, and those prices represent actual and regularly occurring market transactions on an arm's length basis.

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3 Financial risk management (Continued)

3.6 Fair value estimation (Continued)

The Sub-Fund classifies fair value measurements using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements. The fair value hierarchy has the following levels:

- Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1).
- Inputs other than quoted prices included within level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices) (level 2).
- Inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (that is, unobservable inputs) (level 3).

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety is determined on the basis of the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. For this purpose, the significance of an input is assessed against the fair value measurement in its entirety. If a fair value measurement uses observable inputs that require significant adjustment based on unobservable inputs, that measurement is a level 3 measurement. Assessing the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgment, considering factors specific to the asset or liability.

The determination of what constitutes “observable” requires significant judgment by the Sub-Fund. The Sub-Fund considers observable data to be that market data that is readily available, regularly distributed or updated, reliable and verifiable, not proprietary, and provided by independent sources that are actively involved in the relevant market.

As at 31 December 2023 and 2022, the Sub-Fund did not hold any investment.

Investments whose values are based on quoted market prices in active markets, and therefore classified within level 1. The Sub-Fund does not adjust the quoted price for these. As at 31 December 2023 and 2022, there was no level 1 investment held by the Sub-Fund.

Investments that trade in markets that are not considered to be active but are valued based on quoted market prices, dealer quotations or alternative pricing sources supported by observable inputs are classified within level 2.

Investments classified within level 3 have significant unobservable inputs, as they trade infrequently. As at 31 December 2023 and 2022, there was no level 3 investment held by the Sub-Fund.

There was no transfer between levels for the years ended 31 December 2023 and 2022.

The carrying amount of interest receivable, cash and cash equivalents, management fee payable, trustee fee payable, amount payable on redemption of units, accrued expenses and other payables and net assets attributable to unitholders approximated their fair values and are presented in the statement of financial position. There are no financial assets and financial liabilities not carried at fair value but for which the fair value is disclosed.

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3 Financial risk management (Continued)

3.7 Capital risk management

The Sub-Fund's capital is represented by the net assets attributable to unitholders. The Sub-Fund strives to invest the subscriptions in investments that meet the Sub-Fund's investment objectives while maintaining sufficient liquidity to meet unitholder redemptions.

The Management may:

- Redeem and issue new units in accordance with the constitutive documents of the Sub-Fund; and
- Exercise discretion when determining the amount of distributions of the Sub-Fund to the unitholders.

4 Financial instruments by category

Financial assets

Apart from investments which are classified as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, all other financial assets as disclosed in the statement of financial position, including interest receivable and cash and cash equivalents, are categorised as financial assets measured at amortised cost.

Financial liabilities

All financial liabilities as disclosed in the statement of financial position, including management fee payable, trustee fee payable, accrued expenses and other payables and net assets attributable to unitholders, are categorised as financial liabilities measured at amortised cost.

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5 Number of units in issue and net assets attributable to unitholders per unit

Net assets attributable to unitholders are carried at the redemption amount that would be payable if the unitholder exercised the right to redeem the units in the Sub-Fund.

Class A units are available for sale to the retail public. Class E units are offered to distributors. Class I units are offered to institutional investors. Class P units are available for investments by retail investors who invest through distributors submitting dealing orders via distribution channels or distributors specified by the Manager. Class M units are available for investments by managed accounts and other funds managed by the Manager or its associated entities. As at 31 December 2023, the Sub-Fund had HKD Class A units, HKD Class E units, HKD Class I units, HKD Class M units, USD Class A units and HKD Class P units in issue (2022: HKD Class A units, HKD Class E units, HKD Class I units, HKD Class M units, USD Class A units and HKD Class P units in issue).

In accordance with the Sub-Fund's explanatory memorandum, the establishment costs of the Sub-Fund will be amortised over the first 5 years. The costs of establishment of the Sub-Fund are estimated to be approximately HKD165,546. As at 31 December 2023, HKD41,471 (2022: HKD82,830) are unamortized for the Sub-Fund, with remaining amortisation period of 10 months (2022: 1 year and 10 months).

However, the accounting policy of the Sub-Fund for the purpose of financial statements preparation in compliance with IFRS Accounting Standards is to expense establishment costs in the statement of comprehensive income as incurred. The differences between expensing the establishment costs as incurred in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards and capitalisation and amortisation of the establishment costs indicated in the Sub-Fund's explanatory memorandum resulted in adjustment on the net asset value.

As at 31 December 2023 and 2022, the above difference between the dealing net asset value ("Dealing NAV") and the accounting net asset value results an adjustment of HKD41,471 (2022: HKD82,830) below.

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6 Transactions with related parties or connected persons

The following is a summary of transactions entered into during the year between the Sub-Fund and its related parties including the Manager, the investment delegate, the Trustee/custodian and their connected persons (the “Connected Persons”). Connected Persons are those as defined in the SFC Code. All such transactions were entered into in the ordinary course of business and on normal commercial terms. To the best of the Management’s knowledge, the Sub-Fund does not have any other transactions with the Connected Persons except for those disclosed below.

6.1 Management fee

The Manager is entitled to receive a management fee of up to 2% per annum (2022: 2% per annum) of the net asset value of the Sub-Fund. For the year ended 31 December 2023, the Manager charged a management fee of 0.1% per annum (2022: 0.1% per annum) of the net asset value of the Sub-Fund attributed to Class A units, a management fee of 0.05% per annum (2022: 0.05% per annum) of the net asset value of the Sub-Fund attributed to Class I units, a management fee of 0.30% per annum (2022: 0.30% per annum) of the net asset value of the Sub-Fund attributed to Class P units, and a management fee of 0.15% per annum (2022: 0.15% per annum) of the net asset value of the Sub-Fund attributed to Class E units. No management fee is charged in respect of Class M units. The fee calculated and accrued on each valuation day and payable monthly in arrears.

Management fee charged for the year was HKD45,994 (2022: HKD6,208) of which HKD4,282 (2022: HKD3,619) was payable to the Manager.

6.2 Trustee fee

The Trustee is entitled to receive a trustee fee of up to 0.5% per annum (2022: 0.5% per annum) of the net asset value of the Sub-Fund. Currently, the Trustee is entitled to receive a fee of up to 0.075% per annum (2022: 0.075% per annum). The fee is calculated and accrued on each valuation day and payable monthly in arrears.

Trustee fee charged for the year was HKD120,170 (2022: HKD77,046) of which HKD9,815 (2022: HKD7,382) was payable to the Trustee.

6.3 Custodian fee, cash and cash equivalents and investment balances

The custodian, an affiliate of the Trustee, is entitled to receive transaction charges at customary market rates and custody fees at different rates. Such charges and fees will be calculated monthly and payable monthly in arrears. The custodian will be paid a custodian fee of up to 0.026% per annum (2022: 0.026% per annum) of the net asset value of the Sub-Fund. No custodian fee was charged for both 2023 and 2022.

Cash and cash equivalents amounted to HKD3,728,234 (2022: HKD3,778,608) and HKD391 (2022: HKD451) is held with Bank of China (Hong Kong) Limited and Bank of China (Macau) Limited.

Interest income earned from cash and cash equivalents held with Bank of China (Hong Kong) Limited for the period was HKD3,712 (2022: HKD1,856) while the bank charges of Bank of China (Hong Kong) Limited for the period was HKD600 (2022: HKD1,043).

6.4 Transaction handling fees

The Sub-Fund utilises the investment transaction services of the Trustee and the transaction handling fees paid by the Sub-Fund for the year was HKD24,500 (2022: HKD8,000).

6.5 Holdings in the Sub-Fund

The Sub-Fund allows the Manager and its connected persons and other funds managed by the Manager to subscribe for and redeem units in the Sub-Fund. The holdings in the Sub-Fund by the Manager and its connected persons as at 31 December 2023 and 2022 were as follows:

As at 31 December 2023, the Sub-Fund has 9,102,841 units (2022: 9,102,841 units) of Class M (HKD) amounted to HKD97,254,754 (2022: HKD93,477,985) held by Da Cheng Money Market Fund which is managed by the Manager of the Sub-Fund, which represents 64.52% (2022: 81.97%) of the NAV of the Sub-Fund.
